THE CENTER FOR JUDAIC AND INTER-RELIGIOUS STUDIES

SHANDONG UNIVERSITY

The Center for Judaic and Inter-religious Studies at Shandong University was established in 1994 by Professor Fu Youde as the Institute for Jewish Cultural Studies. It was redefined as the Center for Judaic and Inter-religious Studies in 2003 after an official endorsement by the Ministry of Education. This transition marked its recognition as a principal research hub in the humanities and social sciences within Chinese higher education. The center is directed by "Yangtze River Scholar" Distinguished Professor Fu Youde, with Professors Chen Jian, Dong Xiuyuan, and Li Haitao serving as deputy directors. It boasts a dedicated team of 23 full-time and 15 part-time researchers, including nationally recognized talents, distinguished professors, and international scholars.

The center is renowned for its focus on Judaic studies, specializing in Jewish religion and philosophy, and it also embraces broader scholarly pursuits in religious studies, major world religions, and comparative religion. Current research initiatives at the center encompass Jewish and Israeli Studies, Theoretical Religious Studies, Religion and Social Issues, as well as explorations into Confucianism, Taoism, East Asian Cultures, Christianity and Ethnic Relations, and Biblical Interpretation and Classical Studies. Shandong University stands out as one of the select few Chinese institutions that offer continuous undergraduate and graduate programs in religious studies. The center not only facilitates training at the undergraduate, master's, and doctoral levels in collaboration with the Department of Religious Studies but also offers postdoctoral opportunities, thereby significantly contributing to the field by preparing skilled professionals.

Strategic partnerships enhance the center's reach and impact, such as the collaboration with Tel Aviv University to form the SDU-TAU Joint Institute for Jewish and Israeli Studies. The center has been officially recognized as the Shandong Provincial Research Center for Exchange and Cooperation with Israel, accredited by

both the Shandong Provincial Department of Education and the Shandong Foreign Affairs Office. It also collaborates with the Shandong Provincial Ethnic and Religious Affairs Commission to establish the Shandong Provincial Research Base for the Sinicization of Religion. Additionally, the center includes autonomous entities such as the Yao Tsung-I Institute of Religion and Chinese Culture.

The center is equipped with a modern 320 square-meter library that houses over 50,000 books and subscriptions to major international journals, enriched further by donations from global scholars and institutions. Since its foundation, the center has pursued a path of openness and international engagement, focusing on forging robust partnerships with leading global institutions. Looking to the future, it aims to enhance its academic prowess, refine its research focus, and establish itself as a prominent academic bastion and high-end think tank. This aligns with national strategies and developmental objectives, reinforcing its role as a pivotal training ground for religious studies talent and a resource center for information, consultation, and services.
